This picture reminds me that HE holds us in the palm of His hand, even as God held His Son in the palm of His hand.

So it is that every December, Christians await, with anticipation, the re-telling of the greatest story ever told, the birth of our Savior, Jesus. Young children count the days until the 25th, yet many do not clearly understand the deeper meaning of Christmas. They have made out their wish and want lists far in advance in the hope of receiving that longed for cherished gift. Merchants also tell potential shoppers what they want you to do in advertising ploys, then ply their wares in the hope of making huge profits for their businesses but rarely display Jesus' story or play our favorite carols.

Christian churches across most of the world prepare their youth to re-tell Jesus' story with artistic flare and new songs they have learned for this occasion. Church choirs, bell choirs, and praise teams have practiced and then graced us with new hope in their re-telling the old story with blended voices and instruments.



There is another story of births that seems to be somewhat connected to our birth story and that is

found in the message that Jesus gave to Nicodemus.

Found only in the gospel of John in 3: 7-21, we read that one must be 'born again' or born of the spirit to belong to or see the 'kingdom of God.' Jesus was telling the people the story of salvation.

Nicodemus, while a very respected learned man of the leadership spoke to Jesus about this very teaching. He did not understand being born of the flesh and being born of the spirit that Jesus was teaching.

Perhaps he did not understand that it is not about knowing about God but is about knowing God and this is spiritually discerned, (I Cor 2:14). Perhaps being born again is simply getting the ego or I out of the equation and allow God in all aspects of a person's life. Both Charles Spurgon (a Baptist preacher b 1834 d 1892) as well as Watchman Nee (a Chinese Evangelist and bible teacher, b 1903, d 1972) have great perspective on being born again.

Nicodemus was under the law and adhered to that law but could not discern the spirit of Grace so he asked the question many still today ask," how can man be born again as he cannot enter a second time into his mothers womb?"(paraphrased)

Being born again or what some call re-generation is simply having a change of heart or a spiritual transformation, in that we become a new person (II Cor 5: 15) or more Christ like in all our thoughts, words and deeds.

Indeed we celebrate as each person, joins in a new birth when that person comes to the Lord and confesses Jesus as their Lord and Savior. (John 3:16)

This Christmas season as we look to the re-telling of the birth of Jesus, Celebrate Him who gives us life now as well as life in eternity with Him.

This is the week that Paris happened. And the week before that it was Beirut. Just prior to that, a Russian jet exploded in midair. And then there are all the other incidents I've forgotten for the moment. No wonder they call it terrorism. It is terrible. And it terrifies. At first, terror leaves us breathless; and speechless, except for the random expletive, perhaps. But then, after the breathing normalizes a bit, speech returns ... with a vengeance.

Facebook and Twitter, TV news shows, radio talk shows, the halls of Congress, and homes across the country and world vibrated, literally and figuratively, and the vibrations continue.

For some, it is quite personal. The acts of terror took the lives of people they knew and loved and the loss is enormous. For others, the response relates to how the world is working, or not working. Some see it as a predictable result of previous decisions or actions or attitudes. Others see it as an opportunity to rage against a political party or viewpoint or religion.

Some people prayed for Paris. Then it was noted that we hadn't prayed for Beirut. Some thought we should pray for the world while others thought we shouldn't be praying at all, because it wasn't God who did this. And what about the refugees? What about the people who have left home and homeland seeking an opportunity for a decent life for themselves ... for their children. Ah, but then, who ARE those refugees, REALLY? Are they one of THEM?

I am confused, and frightened. And overwhelmed by the enormity of what I see, which I know is but a fraction of what is. I think, actually, I speak for most of us. It just comes out in a lot of different ways when confusion and fear try to express themselves."

As this week's author of the lead article, as someone in a leadership role in the church, as a baptized child of God, I wonder what can be said that might help. And in that wondering, what my heart hears are the soon to come words of the soon to come season of the soon to come savior: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy.

And for now, that's where I have to stay and wait. I'm a few weeks early, but that's okay. In some ways, it's always Advent. And on some days, the only help there is comes from "Fear not".
